15. SUMMER BALL PLAN

Appendix i

London Student Manifesto 2011

Crime

Demand

'We want students to be involved in decisions about policing student activities and events.'

Problem

Recent policing decisions made and the tactics used by the Metropolitan Police have severely damaged the Police's relationship with students.

Solution

The Police should engage with students and their representatives when making the decisions around policing student activities and events. A senior Metropolitan Police official should have responsibility for improving the Police's relationship with London's students.

Demand

'We want an extensive review of the Government's Prevent Strategy to be called.'

Problem

The measures in the *Prevent* Strategy to tackle terrorism and extremism in Universities and Colleges are unhelpful, inflammatory and discriminatory.

Solution

A wide-scale review of the *Prevent* strategy should be called, that will radically alter how countering terrorism and extremism in Universities and Colleges is approached with more effective results.

Demand

'We want a city-wide police strategy for crime prevention and student safety.'

Problem

Criminals perceive students as easy targets with student loans and in possession of the latest technology. Students have a wide range of backgrounds and are often subjects of abuse. Many students are also new to London and the UK and are unused to securing their property.

Solution

Creation and implementation of a comprehensive strategy drawn up after consultation with Students' Unions effectively tackling crimes effecting students.

Transport

Demand

'We want 1/3rd discount on pay as you go and all travel cards for students traveling in London.'

Problem

Travel costs can be a huge expense for students. Weekly, monthly, and annual travel cards are not cost effective and do not reflect students' timetables or frequency of journeys.

Solution

Discounting pay as you go travel will fairly alleviate the costs of studying in London for all students.

Demand

'We want improved cycling provision for students.'

Problem

The cycle hire scheme is limited to particular areas in central London. There are few provisions outside Zone 1, especially in South London. There is a lack of cycle racks and the cycle hire scheme in areas with high numbers of students.

Solution

Put cycle hire scheme racks and lanes in densely populated student areas and extend it out further.

Housing and Living

Demand:

'We want the London Assembly to investigate the poor conditions of student housing'

Problem:

A whole list of issues including the lack of consistency in standards, rising costs, the hazards of discrimination, extortion on deposits, and restrictions on who can be a guarantor for international students.

Solution:

An investigation with a view to potentially create a charter between students and landlords.

Demand:

'We want a maintenance allowance that accurately reflects the costs of being a student in London.'

Problem:

The maintenance allowance puts students living in London approximately £500 over the national poverty line. The cost of living in London and away from home in comparison with the rest of the country is high.

Solution:

Lobby Student Finance to review and increase maintenance loans to better reflect living costs.

Employment

Demand:

'We want internship opportunities to be paid.'

Problem:

Employers can get away with not paying interns because the law is not adequately enforced.

Solution:

As a reward for employers who pay internships a fair wage the Mayor should create an accreditation list. An opposing list should be created for those who don't pay interns fairly.

Demand:

'We want public opposition to damaging restrictions imposed on international students' visas.'

Problem:

The Home Office's new rules on international students' visas are too strict and unreasonable. Applications are handled badly by the UK Borders Agency and processed at an inefficient rate. This management is discouraging international students' applications to our institutions and is harming London's competiveness as a centre for higher education. As consumers, international students contribute massively to London's wider economy. Their presence in our Colleges and Universities make them diverse and worldwide communities where friendships and networks can be created in a globalised world.

Solution:

The harsh restrictions should be opposed and publicly denounced as detrimental to London's economy and not in the interests of our competitiveness as part of a globalised economy.

Imperial College Union A paper for decision on Exhibition Road

This paper provides a means by which to clarify the intended function and use of the redesigned Exhibition Road and to lobby for effective change.

Noting that,

- 1. Some motorists are not slowing down or taking care as this road has intended, as well as going over the speed limit.
- 2. The intended use of the 'roundabout' (Prince Consort Road and Exhibition Road) is unclear and has increased the risk to cyclists
- 3. Some motorists (and some cyclists) don't give way to pedestrians.
- 4. Stone pedestals of lamp posts are not clearly marked, making them hazardous for a car or bicycle wheel.
- 5. There is sufficient space for more Sheffield stands in the centre of the street
- 6. There are 800 metres without assisted crossing, particularly for the elderly or those with disabilities
- 7. There is uncertainty about the boundaries of the road on the west side, particularly the tactile borders.

This board resolves to lobby Westminster Council to:

- 1. Clarify the following:
 - 1. Intended use of the road
 - 2. Whether it is a shared space
 - 3. Priorities on roundabout
- 2. Erect signage at the entrance to the 'shared space' clearly indicating its use
- 3. Either create a true shared space or build a pedestrian crossing near Imperial College Road using the facilities in place under the road
- 4. Consider using average speed cameras to enforce the 20mph speed limit
- 5. Share more information on the use of the road with IC and ICU who are major stakeholders representing a daily footfall of over 15000 per day.

Blended Learning Policy

Purpose: This paper is to decide if Imperial College Unions supports the expansion of

blended learning in the form of video podcasting and OpenCourseWare.

Background

Video podcasting refers to Imperial College lecture courses being recorded in the form of video and uploaded online internally for Imperial College students only.

Fellow IDEA League university member, "TU Delft" has an excellent video podcasting scheme (http://goo.gl/QdegP) with dual video streams. Both resizable video boxes, one displays the lecture notes and the other displays a video of the lecture (where the camera will zoom in and out depending on the lecture content).

From 2010-11 TU Delfts expenditure was €280,000 for approximately 1700 lecture video recordings.

In February 2012 the e-Learning Strategy Committee approved the recommendation to roll-out the video capturing product called "Panopto" after an extended 4 month pilot study across all faculties (in which time 229 successful recordings were made). The extended pilot feedback was positive with FoE, FoNS and FoM wishing to continue using Panopto, finding it useful for lectures, revision, lab experiments, tutorials and reaching students with disabilities. The feedback also stated that all faculties were pleased to see no noticeable decline in student numbers at recorded lectures.

Panopto is a completely different solution to TU Delfts video podcasting. TU Delft employs a student for every lecture, paying €10 an hour, to capture and edit every lecture course. Panopto is a far cheaper software solution that consists of "Personal recorders" and "Remote recorders". Personal recorders are what several lectures around the college already use, where the lecturer controls and records the lecture themselves. Remote Recorders are where recordings that are scheduled in advance that start/stop automatically.

OpenCourseWare (OCW) refers to a free and openly licensed digital publication of high quality university level education materials (including lecture notes, slides, problems and videos).

TU Delft has made significant investment into OpenCourseWare over the last year as have several more world leadings universities in the United States of America. Massachusetts Institute of Technology (MIT) for example has had its OpenCourseWare programme for over a decade (http://ocw.mit.edu/courses/) and recently announced it plans to award diplomas to "virtual" students. Similarly Stamford excels in OpenCourseWare (http://see.stanford.edu/) with material publically available on YouTube, iTunes U and available for download.

Imperial College e-Learning Strategy Committee are keen to become UK leaders with OpenCourseWare by writing a proposal for management board to roll out an Imperial OCW (although UCL and Bristol are also planning on expanding their own OCW). A sample of what it could look like is available here (including a FoNS Chemistry course): www3.imperial.ac.uk/OpenCourseWare.

Believes

- Imperial College students will benefit from video podcasting use as an extremely practical revision tool.
- Imperial College students, with an active interest in other disciplines will benefit greatly with the
 opportunity to broaden their academic range. Students will have the opportunity to become
 more inter-disciplinary (i.e. students can study additional courses offered by Imperial College), for
 example, Physics students learning some EEE course or Chemistry students learning Advanced
 Quantum Mechanics from Physics.

- There is no currently available evidence that correlates video podcasting introduction to a reduction in attendance.
- The general public will benefit from having access to these materials.
- Imperial College will greatly improve their international reputation by providing lecture courses open-source as well as catch up with the world leading American universities in this area.
- OCW can boost the image of STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Maths subjects and inspire prospective and school students into pursuing a career in STEM subjects.
- OCW will allow prospective students to sample Imperial College lecture courses and allow Imperial College to showcase some its best lecturers.

Resolves

- 1. For Imperial College Union to support Imperial College establishing a video podcasting service for lecture courses.
- 2. For Imperial College Union to support Imperial College establishing an OpenCourseWare platform.
