Stance on International Student Fees in response to COVID-19

Union notes:

 International taught student tuition fees have been increasing and are already very high. Currently for 2019/20 undergraduates fees are https://www.imperial.ac.uk/students/fees-and-funding/tuition-fees/:

Engineering: ~£31,750; Medicine: ~£44,000; Natural Sciences: ~£30,000

- 2. The COVID-19 pandemic has directly affected the financial circumstances of students in various unforeseen ways:
 - Loss of part-time jobs / being furloughed
 - Family bereavement
 - · General economic downturn and uncertainty
- 3. A survey run by the International Officer, sent to all taught students in early October, received at least 200 individually written responses. Outcomes of the survey indicate:
 - Many international students require financial support or leniency on tuition fees due to circumstances out of their control, directly caused by the pandemic
 - Perception of reduced value of education due to remote learning (not utilising the school facilities)
 - Consensus on tuition fees being too high in the current global pandemic
- 4. Payments of tuition fees in instalments require 1% service fee (for 2 separate payments). This is not in line with common practices among London universities.
 - Students might reasonably prefer to pay in instalments during times of economic uncertainty
 - The London School of Economic and Political Sciences, University College London allow 3 separate payments with no additional fee [https://info.lse.ac.uk/staff/divisions/Finance-Division/Fees-Income-and-Credit-Control/Tuition-Fees] [https://www.ucl.ac.uk/students/fees/pay-your-fees/when-to-pay]
- 5. From 20/21 onwards there will be an increased proportion of students paying international fees due to Brexit.

Union believes:

- 1. International fees are too high considering the current pandemic
- 2. It's unreasonable for students to suffer because of circumstances beyond their control

- 3. The College's financial position is much more secure than was expected before the start of this academic year, although they are unlikely to countenance substantial across the board fee reductions.
- 4. There is a need for greater transparency on how tuition fees are spent (LSE: https://info.lse.ac.uk/staff/divisions/Finance-Division/Fees-Income-and-Credit-Control/How-are-your-tuition-fees-spent] and the fee-setting process
- 5. There is a need to acknowledge students are not getting as much value from their fees in the 2020/21 academic year, compared to prior years
- 6. It is reasonable to lobby for:
 - 6.1. Case by case reductions based on hardship
 - 6.2. Making the case to suspend or limit extra costs incurred from paying by instalments
 - 6.3. Suspending or limiting increases on coming years

Union resolves:

- 1. To support lobbying efforts along the lines of Union believes point 6.
- 2. To action the International Student Network to meet with relevant College staff
 - a. To gather more information about how fees are levied/spent and how hardship funding has hitherto been distributed
 - b. To lobby the College to make reasonable accommodations to fees following the principles set out above (6.2/6.3 above)
- 3. That the International officer should report back to next Council meeting with an update
